Cabin and shower renovation: This winter, each of our cabins are being fitted with new tin roofs (remember the sound of rain?), new wooden decks to encourage small gatherings and R & R, new tile on the bathroom floors, and an on-demand hot water system has been added (ahhhh.....need we say more?).

Property upgrades: By the time camp sessions begin, we will have re-graded the roads and groomed the trails. We plan to upgrade the ropes course, add a new staff laundry facility (no more stinky counselors!), and have the outdoor wood-fired pizza oven ready for use.

Program enhancements: We will continue our commitment to providing challenging and high-quality arts and crafts experiences for our campers. We are installing a new kiln for the ceramics program, expanding the blacksmithing activities so more campers can

Last summer, Heath and Bruce would not stop bugging me about going back to camp with the final group of the summer. My name is Jeff Killebrew, and I work with an inner-city youth ministry in New Orleans. Each year we take small groups of teenage boys to our own little adventure camp in the mountains of North Georgia. Rafting, hiking, tubing, camping, swimming, capture the flag in the woods and more. It was worlds away from back home, and Heath and Bruce loved it so much they stopped in my office everyday and insisted I take them again. Waiting for next summer was just too long.



Opportunities like these are rare for urban youth. Many of those involved in our organization have never seen a mountain. Never been on a boat. Most could count on one hand the number of times they’ve been out of the city. Taking them to camp for the first time blows their minds, and they talk about it year round.

While these new and adventurous activities are central and critical components of the camp experience, the real beauty of it all lives in the focused, uninterrupted opportunity to help young people mature, make wise decisions and become better equipped for the challenges they face back home.

The kids in New Orleans deal with many of the same obstacles young people from other impoverished, inner-city communities must overcome in order to succeed. While the cards often seem stacked against them, they are filled with as much potential as any child growing up in a more privileged setting.

And camp often serves an environment where they begin to believe this last statement is true. They experience new things and build self-confidence. They realize trusting in others is possible, and they determine to become trustworthy themselves. They begin to see their lives have promise, and they return home with new insights, perspectives, values and hope.

At Camp Arrowhead, we want to serve these “Children of Promise,” because we want to play a role in changing their communities. By providing an exceptional Arrowhead experience for these young people, we can begin to make small but significant changes in their lives. As they become young men they will begin to have greater impact in their own neighborhoods, and new cycles of promise and hope will flourish.

I am excited to be working with Arrowhead in order to make these opportunities real for urban youth, for boys like Heath and Bruce, who went with me to camp a second time. Heath brought his god-brother and Bruce brought his neighbor. They’re becoming leaders already, and that’s what it is all about.
